HOW QUICK ACTION SAVED MOSS' LIFE

Originally found as a stray wandering the streets, Moss arrived at our facility with a persistent cough. Other than this symptom, which should have been easily treated with antibiotics and rest in a volunteer foster home, his gentle demeanor and perpetually-wagging tail showed signs of a happy, healthy dog. Unfortunately, further testing revealed a much more severe condition lurking below: heartworm disease.

Heartworm disease is a mosquito-borne parasite, most commonly contracted by members of the canine family. If left untreated, a heartworm infection will cause fatal damage to a dog's heart, lungs, and arteries. Treatment is effective, but challenging, requiring months of special care ranging from antibiotics and injections to eradicate the heartworms. This is all capped off with severe exercise restrictions to prevent worms from traveling

through the body and obstructing blood vessels.

Moss immediately began treatment — including injections and antibiotics — to eradicate the heartworms. Luckily, our in-house clinic discovered his parasitic infection before it led to dire complications. Once said treatment was underway (and the outlook was positive), Moss was officially deemed ready for adoption. Our team had fallen in love with his goofy personality and soulful eyes, and it didn't take long

THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME FOR PETS IN NEED

You've likely heard about our assistance programs and our mission to keep pets out of shelters and in the care of the families who love them. From free pet food to advice and referrals to low-cost veterinary services, we offer a wide range of programs dedicated to stopping pet homelessness at the source.

Oliver had been rushed to an emergency clinic while suffering from a urinary obstruction — a potentially lifethreatening condition for male cats. Oliver's family had a very difficult decision to make. They couldn't afford treatment at the emergency clinic, but the thought of euthanizing their beloved cat was unbearable. Thankfully, they reached out to our team for advice, and our dedicated veterinary staff sprang into action. Oliver's case turned out to be even trickier than expected. Every time his urinary catheter was removed, he quickly became re-blocked, and the process had to be started from scratch. It soon became apparent that he would require specialized surgery to fix this problem — surgery that was beyond the scope of our in-house clinic. But thanks to our assistance programs, Oliver was paired with a board-certified surgeon, who was able to operate on him right here in our clinic.

When you look at our impact by the numbers, "47,000+ cats and dogs adopted" isn't the whole story. There are also tens of thousands of animals who have received lifesaving care through our assistance programs, Veteran services, spay/neuter clinic, and beyond. Your support helps keep at-risk animals out of crowded







shelters and on the path toward a happy future — whether that future is in a brand new forever home or alongside the only happy family they've ever known.



for a dedicated adopter to become smitten with those same characteristics. Plus, with more than two months left on his heartworm regimen at the time of adoption,



he still returned many times for follow-up treatments, giving him a chance to stop by to say "hi" to the ARF staff who saved his life!

GOOD NEWS FOR GARFIELD

When we first met Garfield, we were amazed at what a unique character he was. At 20 pounds, this larger-than-life, affectionate, orange tabby looked like he was pulled right from the cartoons (no word on how he feels about Mondays). But despite a high-quality diet and proper care, the 10-year-old cat was struggling with an upset stomach that just wouldn't go away.

Our veterinary team took Garfield to an internal medicine specialist to perform an ultrasound to find out why he was unwell. It was apparent that Garfield had inflammation throughout his gastrointestinal tract that needed more investigation. Our team feared the worse and performed a biopsy of his intestines to check for cancerous lymphomas.

Thankfully, the tests were negative for lymphoma, and we were finally able to determine that Garfield had inflammatory bowel disease (IBD). It is unknown how long he suffered from IBD, but now his symptoms are managed through anti-inflammatory medication and a





prescription diet. Although there currently isn't a cure for IBD, Garfield is thankfully now pain-free!

At many overcrowded, under-resourced shelters across the country, ultrasounds and biopsies wouldn't be feasible for a senior cat like Garfield. But thanks to supporters like you, we're able to pull out all the stops and ensure every one of our animals is given the best-possible chance to live a happy, healthy life. *

John's daughter, a psychologist for first responders, knew the incredible benefits a service animal could have for their handler. She recommended her father, a Navy Veteran, try to obtain a service animal. When John's wife heard about our Pets and Vets program at the Department of Veterans Affairs, John knew it was time to begin the process.

Our team paired John with Bruno, a 55-pound German Shepherd mix found as a stray in Tehama County. Malnourished and covered in foxtails, Bruno wasn't in great shape. But after a few weeks of loving care in a foster home, a whole new dog began showing through. And he blossomed even more once he met John.

Coincidentally, John participated in a six-week cognitive training held by the VA to test his sleep efficiency around this time. His change in sleep quality since welcoming Bruno was astounding. "I was sleeping at 64% efficiency before I had Bruno," he told us. "By the end of the six weeks with Bruno I improved to 99%." With a bed right beside John's, Bruno puts his paw on John to calm him and help him fall back asleep when he wakes in the night.

Whether out in busy, public spaces or within the confines of their home, our Pets and Vets dogs assist their partners night and day. "For a lot of us Veterans, we live a different life," John said with a smile. *



GOLDEN RETRIEVER PUPPIES DEFY THE ODDS

Even at only a couple of months old, animals can be inspirational. That's certainly the case with a litter of sick golden retriever puppies who recently came into our shelter. Lethargic and underweight, these pups were in critical need of immediate medical attention. One puppy in the litter had already perished, and another was too sick and succumbed to her illness within a few hours of arrival. But we were determined!

Our clinic team quarantined the siblings, administered subcutaneous fluids to address their dehydration, and rushed into action with emergency testing. The pups tested negative for parvovirus and giardia, two deadly diseases that are not uncommon in puppies. Further testing found signs of oocysts, a clear indication of a coccidia infection. Coccidia, a parasite that lives in a dog's intestine, is extremely serious for dogs — especially for vulnerable puppies. We knew we had to act fast.

Many coccidia treatments simply interfere with the parasite's reproductive cycle, causing the infection

to die out over the course of a few weeks. But these puppies were already in dire condition, as the disease had been untreated for too long. Time was not on our side. A specialty medication was administered to provide faster relief. Throughout their treatment, the litter of puppies remained quarantined in volunteer foster homes. They gained more strength (and spunkiness) every single day. A full month after entering our care, they were healthy enough for adoption. And you better believe there was a queue of people down the block, all lined up for a chance to bring home one of these inspirational cuties.



GUARDIAN PROGRAM GIVES ZOEY A FRESH START

While it may not be pleasant to think about, who will look after your pet if something were to happen to you?

Zoey Sunshine (aka Zoey) was well-loved by Martha, who sang precious lullabies to her every day. But when Martha was diagnosed with stage IV cancer, she knew she had to think of Zoey's future. "My doctors have advised me to start making arrangements so when my 'time' arrives, I will have prepared a place for my little dog-daughter to be cared for and loved until placement can be found for her next forever home," Martha wrote in a heartbreaking letter to our team.

As a member of our Guardian Program, Martha named ARF a beneficiary in her will and transferred responsibility for her beloved dog to our team. Zoey was an older pup with multiple existing health issues, including seizures, but that didn't stop us from ensuring



her future was bright.

After 64 days of ongoing medical attention and loving care in a foster home, Zoey found her match. Her new family told us, "I cannot imagine our home without her. I would encourage people to consider adopting a mature dog who still has a lot of love to share."

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: Tracy Gramata

When Tracy learned we needed a volunteer coordinator to help relaunch the Pet Hug Pack® — our therapy animal program that had been on hiatus since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic — she was intrigued by the opportunity. We needed to ensure our therapy animals' skills still hit the mark to conduct the program safely for both animals and visit recipients.

"I have always loved the Pet Hug Pack® program. Unfortunately, my late dogs weren't the right fit to be therapy animals. But the impact these special animals have on children, nursing home residents, and hospital patients inspired me to get involved on the administrative side," says Tracy.

Motivated to help the Pet Hug Pack® resume its services, Tracy organized the re-certification of more than 30 therapy animal teams and onboarded several brand new teams. "We partnered with certified evaluators from Mount Diablo Dog Training Club to review the original skills required from the American Kennel Club's Canine Good Citizen® test," says Tracy. "Watching the testing opened my eyes to the importance of the working relationship between the animal and their handler."

In addition to learning a lot during this process, Tracy has become even more impressed with the Pet Hug Pack® teams. "I'm so thankful to the volunteer handlers for all of their hard work. I love hearing their stories about how their animals help those in need. They bring so much joy and love into people's lives."

Tracy is eager to welcome even more teams to the pack! The popular program currently has a waiting list of nearly 20 facilities, including hospitals, nursing

TELL YOUR IRA TO "ROLLOVER"

Did you know animal-lovers 70 ½ years old and older can reduce their taxes by making a gift to ARF directly from their tax-deferred individual retirement account (IRA)?



An IRA rollover is a simple way for you to use your IRA to save lives. Unlike a regular IRA withdrawal, making a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) up to \$100,000 to a charity (like ARF) doesn't count as additional income, isn't taxable, and doesn't push you into a higher tax bracket or reduce your eligibility for certain tax credits and deductions. Additionally, if you're 72 years old or older, your IRA rollover gift counts toward your annual minimum distribution (RMD) and is excluded from taxable income!

MEL AND BETTY FINALLY FIND THEIR PERFECT MATCHES

Unlike shelters that euthanize for space, we're committed to finding the right match for animals, however long it takes. With our average length of stay at less than three weeks, extra-long residencies are rare. But in the past few months, we've had two dogs find homes after a full year in our care, Mel was adopted in July after 387 days, and Betty was adopted in September after 367 days.

As a senior dog with health issues stemming from a spinal injury, Mel spent much of her time at ARF working toward regaining her strength through physical therapy, hydrotherapy, and even acupuncture. She was looking for a home where she could continue her physical therapy. Her adopter was drawn to her having previously had a dog with similar needs — and even a similar look! There wasn't a dry eye at our shelter on the day this sweet girl went home.

Betty gave birth to a litter of puppies last summer and watched them all get adopted, one-by-one. Her supercuddly and social personality wooed potential adopters, but her reactivity toward other dogs while out on walks often spooked them from taking her home for good. Thankfully, she made great strides working with our behavior team and found a family ready to continue her training at home while she happily showers them with love and affection.


